



1 **Mabie-Beech House:** Built in 1835 by Cornelius Mabie. Contains wing of earlier house which stood 200' to the East.



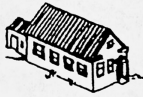
2 **Bogert-Haring House:** Late eighteenth century sandstone house was home to nine generations of Bogerts and Harings.



3 **Haring-Adams House:** Built in 1790. Macy Deming manufactured first baby food, Cereo, here.



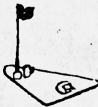
4 **Cardona House:** First Rockland County Schoolhouse; used as school until 1860. Built of stone and brick, in 1711, on church land.



5 **The Academy:** Built in 1843 as a private school by Pastor Isaac Cole on land leased from church. Son, David Cole, was a teacher. Now private dwelling.



6 **Reformed Church of Tappan:** Organized 1694. Present church, built 1835, third on site. Architecture Federal and Greek revival. Second church was scene of Andre trial. Also used as prison/hospital after Baylor Massacre in 1778.



7 **Village Church Green:** Site of first Orange County courthouse and jail. Built 1691, burned 1774. Site of Liberty Pole, stocks, whipping post, and stray cattle pound.



8 **Manse:** Built 1729, oldest parsonage in continuous use in U.S. Architecture Hudson Valley Dutch Colonial. Reverend Samuel Verbryck, friend of Washington, who helped found Rutgers University, resided here.



9 **Bartow-Samett Town House:** Built in 1835 by Morris Bartow. Probable site of Yost Mabie's house where Orangetown Resolutions were signed in 1774.



10 **Mabie House-76' House:** Built by Casparus Mabie 1755. John Andre imprisoned here in September 1780. First used as tavern in 1800 by Philip DuBuy.



11 **Tappan Library:** Earliest section built in 1750, four additions. Restored frame country house typical of Hudson Valley.



12 **Tar Barrel Elm Site:** Tall elm was part of Revolutionary War alarm system. Flaming tar barrel hoisted to top as signal. Tree was removed in 1953.



13 **DeClark-DeWint House:** Built in 1700, oldest house in Rockland County. Used by Washington on four occasions. Period furnishings. Tagged trees. Open 10-4 daily.



14 **Was the largest Weeping Willow in the U.S.** Age was about 160 years; height 85'; circumference, 40 ft. Was felled by storm in 1987.



15 **Andre Monument:** Site of hanging of Major John Andre on October 2, 1780. Old Tappan Road west to André Hill, (2nd road on left after crossing RR tracks)
